

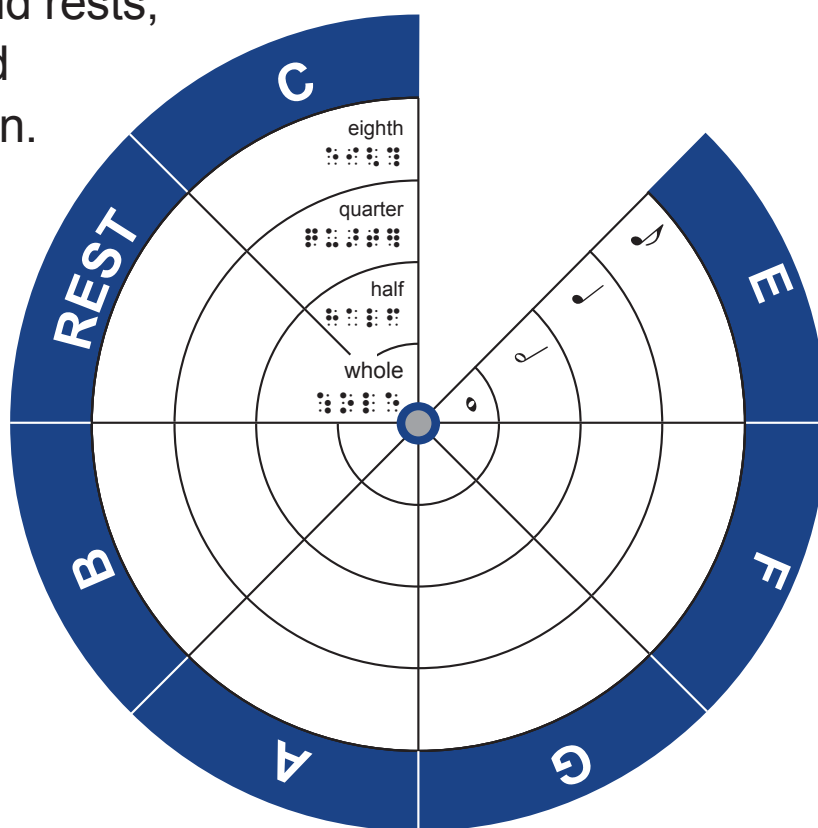
Music Braille Wheel

Use and Resource Guide

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The music braille wheel was created to help students, TVIs, families, and music teachers quickly reference the dot formations of music braille notes. The wheel has the musical notes; C-D-E-F-G-A-B and rests, with the print symbol, and simulated braille formation.

A reference guide is included that shows the specific braille dot numbers for each note and their corresponding solfege. When looking for a specific braille music symbol, rotate the inner circle to show the music braille symbols for each note and value.



- This wheel can be given to the braille learner's music teacher so that they can follow along as the student is reading their braille music. By using the same terminology, this helps solidify concepts and allows for the student and teacher to learn together.
- The wheel can also be used as a reference for a braille reader to look up a music braille note or rest that they forgot.
- Encourage peers, teachers, and families to use the correct music braille terminology by stating the dots of the basic note first, followed by the dots in the bottom of the cell, which indicate the rhythm value for that note.
 - For example, C eighth note would be read as, dots 1-4-5; C half note would be read as, dots 1-4-5-6; C whole note would be read 1-4-5-3-6 and so on.

Remember to refer to each note by its note name or dot numbers. **DO NOT REFER TO ITS LITERARY EQUIVALENT!!!** Calling a note by its literary name will make it more difficult to learn and read the notes quickly.

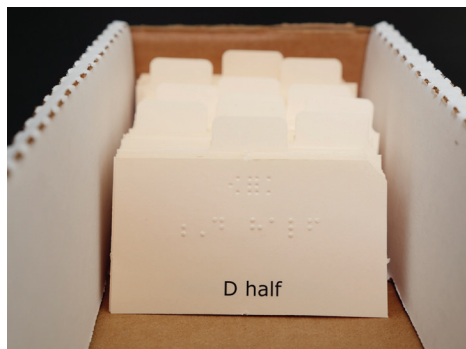

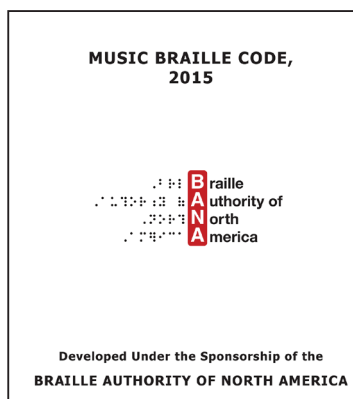

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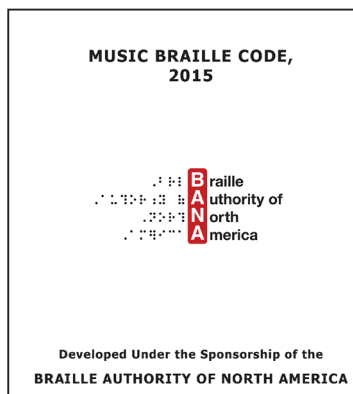
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
